Campaign Against Human Trafficking (CAHT)

The Campaign Against Human Trafficking – Southshore (CAHT) has been active in the south shore since 2009. Throughout the years, United Methodist Church has been an active supporter and partner in our efforts to end human trafficking.

Here in the south shore of Hillsborough County we have challenges with both labor and sex trafficking. Our County Sheriff's office and the Hillsborough County Human Trafficking Task Force work hard to identify and eliminate the threats to our community.

CAHT continues with our commitment to supporting victims, celebrating survivors, reducing demand, and ending human trafficking.

This year we have several goals:

- Continue to support our victims and survivors with the rescue backpack and mentoring programs
- Recruit volunteers to support our programs
- Expand our Trafficking Free Zone community awareness program
- Begin outreach to men's organizations
- Begin a Survivor Scholarship fund to assist survivors as they complete their program and begin their new life
- Explore the possibility of creating the first safe home/shelter program for human trafficking victims in this area

We invite you to join our organization and support the cause of eliminating human trafficking.

Committed to Supporting Victims

Our Survivor Services Team assembles Rescue Back Packs and distributes them to law enforcement agencies, shelters, and various organizations. Each Rescue Back Pack includes toiletries, cosmetics, clothing, shoes, a journal, a blanket, a pillow, water bottles, and a cuddly beanie baby. In the last five years, we have prepared and distributed a total of 845 bags.

Committed to Celebrating Survivors

Our Survivor Services Team is thoroughly vetted and trained to visit shelters and provide mentorship to survivors. They prepare meals, engage in crafts, socialize, and spend quality time with them. Since many survivors have not experienced a typical life, this mentorship aids them in understanding and participating in daily living activities.



Committed to Reducing Demand



It is a reality that children in our own communities are being bought and sold. To combat human trafficking effectively, it is essential to focus on its root cause: the demand. Implementing law enforcement, imposing stricter penalties on offenders, and introducing various deterrent measures have demonstrated that reducing demand is effective.

CAHT is collaborating with US Institutes Against Human Trafficking to enhance awareness within our communities, offer training, and assist our residents in creating a Trafficking Free Zone.

Budget Update

The Finance committee presented a balanced budget of \$1,944,000 to the Administrative Council on December 10. This budget ends the church's prior practice of using reserve funds/savings to supplement the annual operating budget. The 2025 budget represents an 18% decrease from 2024 expenses. You may ask for a copy of the 2025 budget in the church office.

How did we accomplish the reduction in expenses?

Staffing reductions = 26% total (as follows)

Pastoral – reduced 30% (7/1/24) by moving from 3 pastors to 2

Program – reduced 50% with elimination of nursery coordinator and paid kitchen staff

Administrative – reduced 18% by outsourcing a portion of accounting responsibilities

Facilities and Grounds reductions = 10%

Office and Administration reductions = 18%

Healing From Loss is a Journey: *Everyone Experiences Grief Differently*

A new Grief Share session will begin on Wednesday, January 29th and continuing Wednesdays through April 23rd, at 6:30 PM – 8:00 PM in room 19. This 13-week grief support group will be led by Pastor Debbie Marion, Minister of Pastoral Care, and Renee Childs, and focuses on important grief topics associated with the death of a loved one.

Weekly videos feature nationally respected grief experts and real-life stories of people, followed by a group discussion where confidentiality is key to this program.

Many grieving people find they are only beginning the work of healing while friends or family members have returned to their daily life routines. Too often people tend to repress their grief and allow fear of what others may think keeping you from what could be helping you. Your bereavement experience may be recent, or not so recent. The hope is that you will find encouragement, comfort, and help in grieving the death of a spouse, child, sibling, other family members, or a friend. No matter what the cause of your loved one's death, this is an opportunity to be around people who understand what you are feeling. You will learn how to recognize the symptoms of being stuck in your grief and that you do not need to stay there. You will learn valuable information about dealing with the changes in your life and renewing your hope for the future. I hope you will consider being part of this valuable ministry.


